Safe and Supportive Learning Environments

This interactive workshop is designed to provide educators with the legal framework for identifying and responding to current and emerging First Amendment and civil rights-related issues in schools and cyberspace in today's political climate. The workshop will examine students First Amendment rights and the legal requirements for addressing incidents under the state's bullying law, and federal and state civil rights laws that protect students from victimization based on their race, color, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, and disability. Participants will review case studies to learn how to more effectively assess and respond to speech and conduct constituting bullying or discriminatory harassment, without violating students' First Amendment rights. The workshop will also explore challenges administrators face in complying with DESE's discipline regulations and federal civil rights law requirements for protecting victim rights when imposing discipline involving civil rights.
