Can schools ensure that all of their students are graduating prepared to be able to participate as effective citizens, workers and learners? Schools can increase student engagement and achievement by examining how students engage with their learning both inside and outside of school. Developing more student-centered approaches to learning will result in deeper engagement and better results. Participants in this workshop will focus on a variety of strategies that schools can increase equity, rigor and personalization.

Participants will:

- Examine classroom practices that will increase personalization of learning
- Understand how a competency-based approach to learning and assessment will increase engagement and rigor for all students.
- Explore how the use of multiple pathways can increase engagement and meet the unique needs of each learner.
- Learn about how increasing student voice and choice into schools to better engage learners.
- Explore how technology, effectively utilized, can increase personalization of learning.
- Develop or revise a plan for their school based on the new learning.

Ted Hall has been on the cutting edge of school transformation over the past 20 years. An accomplished principal of several high schools in New England, Ted has also worked for two of the most prominent school reform organizations in the country—the Coalition for Essential Schools/Annenberg Institute for School Reform at Brown University and the National School Reform Faculty. For two years he worked with Ted Sizer at Brown University where he designed and implemented professional development programs, particularly for math and science teachers. While serving on the Institute's Governance Council, he also taught "The Craft of Teaching."
